
I wish for each of you and your Families a very Blessed Christmas and Joyous New Year! Please remember to do all within your power to Stay Safe & Healthy!



REACHING OUT

What do you do in a Pandemic? You reach out to your members with a helping hand.

We realized early on that members that were self-quarantining at home could have difficulty with many aspects of daily living. The first of which would be loneliness for those who are in single person households. Some may have trouble getting out for groceries. Were the members staying well? Did they need any help?

We found members that needed help with lawn mowing and our Masonic Brothers at 252 stepped up to help out with this need. They are a great group of guys and we appreciated their help.

Next, we checked to see if people needed help with groceries, some members were afraid to go to the store, so we picked up items or told them how to do online shopping. I had to learn online shopping myself. Some members needed masks and they were provided. They weren't always perfect, but they were happy to receive them.

The biggest hurdle was loneliness. We arranged zoom visits, and occasional outdoor get-togethers in very small groups with social distancing. We still weren't touching enough members and we decided to make surprise deliveries. Over the course of the following weeks we delivered a ham dinner, chicken salad, cookies, cupcakes, muffins, books and human contact. It was so wonderful to see the smiling eyes, we of course wore our masks and social distanced. We usually managed to be in contact with about 20 members each time.

When we were able to meet as a Chapter again our Secretary, Karen Cook, who is also our Membership Committee chair introduced us to a new idea. Each officer was given the name of 5 or 6 members to stay in contact with through phone calls, cards or visits. We have just started this project so we are hoping it will bring our Chapter closer together over the next few months.

HELPING OUR LOCAL FOOD BANKS

Okemos Chapter 267 is busy with our annual Pie Sales for the Food Banks. We knew with the Covid situation that our sales could suffer this year. We were totally surprised to have us match last year's sales with over 200 pies sold. The last orders will not be in for a few days yet so we don't know if we will beat our record sales of last year yet.

We sell 11 inch apple, pumpkin and pecan pies. All are made from scratch. Even the apples are picked by our members at a local orchard. We take great pride in producing a quality product.

History Lesson 1911 (This book was selected at random)

The Worthy Grand Matron was: Lizzie I. Harrison from Bethlehem Chapter #105 The Worthy Grand Patron was: John Rawson from Grand Rapids Chapter #318 The Session was held at The Jackson Masonic Temple, October 11-12, 1911, and opened at 10am.

There were 366 Chartered Chapters and 10 Chapters under Dispensation. A total of 376 Chapters. During the year 3,700 members were initiated, 503 members were affiliated, and 139 members were restored for a total of 4,422 new members. The present membership was 47,961.

The largest Chapter was Peninsular #65 in Grand Rapids, with 850 members. The second largest was Oriental #32 in Grand Rapids with 563 members and the third largest was Palestine #80 in Detroit with 551 members.

The Worthy Grand Matron made 181 official visits to Chapters and Associations. Think of how difficult that was with fewer cars, train rides and even some horse and buggy trips.

The Grand Secretary sent out to the Chapters 1,900 letters.

We had an Eastern Star Home in Grand Rapids supported by the Grand Chapter.

During the year 1910 the Masonic Home burned. A brother gave the Masons land and a building in Alma for a new Sanatorium. It was being rebuilt at this time. Our Worthy Grand Matron and a Past Grand Matron were on the Masonic Home board. The Eastern Star had started raising money for a hospital at the home. The special project this year was for the hospital at the home. \$670.95 was collected from the Chapters and the Grand Chapter added \$300.00 for a total of \$970.95.

Grand Representatives recommended by the Worthy Grand Matron were Past Grand Matrons and Past Grand Patrons. More than one State were represented by several of these Past Grand Matrons and Past Grand Patrons.

The Grand Officers initiated 2 new members at the evening of the first day of the session. The election was the first order of business on the second day. Several cities presented their qualifications for the next years' meeting, after which the delegates voted on what they thought best.

There was no special Memorial like we have now. Members who passed were recognized by the Obituary Committee.

Installation was held and Grand Chapter closed until 1912.




